## UG Admission 2021: General Information \& Instructions

BA Honours/ BSc Honours/ BA Liberal Arts/ BCA

## 1. Programmes of Study:

(I) BA Honours: This is a three-year Honours degree programme of 140 credits covered in 6 (six) semesters with the UGC recommended CBCS curriculum.
(II) BSc Honours: This is a three-year Honours degree programme of 140 credits covered in 6 (six) semesters with the UGC recommended CBCS curriculum.
(III) BA Liberal Arts: This is a three-year degree programme of 132 credits covered in 6 (six) semesters. In the first two semesters of this program a student shall learn a broad range of subjects, at the end of which she/he is expected to identify one particular subject as her/his special interest. From the $3^{\text {rd }}$ semester the student can learn the subject more rigorously as her/his Major subject (Specialization). The student continues to get exposure to diverse topics across disciplines through the Enabler' and Skill Enhancement' courses and also learns the basics of independent research through a Capstone project.
(IV) BA Honours in Mass Communication \& Journalism: This is a self-financing threeyear Honours degree programme of 140 credits.
(V) BSc Honours in Biotechnology: This is a self-financing three-year Honours degree programme of 140 credits.
(VI) BCA: This is a self-financing three-year degree programme of 140 credits in Computer Applications, covered in 6 (six) semesters.

## 2. Basic Eligibility Condition:

- The minimum eligibility criterion for admission to any of the UG programmes is to pass the qualifying Higher Secondary (HS) or equivalent (10+2) examination from a recognized Board or Council with a minimum of $60 \%$ marks ( $55 \%$ for OBC/MOBC, SC, $\mathrm{ST}(\mathrm{P})$ and $\mathrm{ST}(\mathrm{H})$ candidates). The minimum marks condition does not apply for Differently Abled candidates.
- To apply for admission to the BSc Honours programmes other than Mathematics, Statistics and Geography, the applicant must pass the qualifying examination with the minimum marks stated above in Science stream. However for BSc Honours in Mathematics, Statistics and Geography, candidates from any stream (Science, Arts or Commerce) may apply.
- Applicants who passed the qualifying examination from Arts or Commerce stream and wish to be considered for Mathematics, Statistics or Geography Honours will have to additionally submit an online application for BSC Honours.
- BA Honours, BA Liberal Arts and BCA programmes are open for students having passed the qualifying examination in any stream (Science, Arts or Commerce).
- Subject specific additional eligibility conditions are mentioned in the following pages.


## 3. Number Of Seats And Eligibility Criteria

For the session 2021-22 Cotton University has increased the number of students to be admitted in each UG programme by $25 \%$ above the regular intake capacity as a special case. The additional seats shall be reserved for students having passed HS from Assam Higher Secondary Education Council (AHSEC).

## 4. How To Apply:

4.1 Application for admission to any UG programmee in Cotton University must be filled up and submitted ONLINE through the University website www.cottonuniversity.ac.in. There will be separate application windows/tabs for the following programmes:
(i) BA Honours (except in Mass Communication and Journalism)
(ii) BSc Honours (except in Biotechnology)
(iii) BA Liberal Arts
(iv) BCA (Bachelor of Computer Applications (Self-financing course))
(v) BSc Honours in Biotechnology (Self-financing course)
(vi) BA Honours in Mass Communication and Journalism (Self-financing course)
4.2 Applicants may apply for more than one of the programmes/courses listed above. Admission will be strictly in order of merit as explained in Section 5 below and governed by the University's Admission Rules and Regulations. The Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor's decision regarding admission shall be considered as final. Application is free of charge.
4.3 Documents to be submitted ONLINE while applying or at the time of Admission:
a. Pass Certificate and Marksheet of the qualifying examination (HS or equivalent 10+2 examination from a recognized board or council).
b. Reserved Category Certificate if applicable (Only certificates issued by competent authority under the Government of Assam shall be deemed valid).
c. A copy of Passport size photograph (in jpg format, $50-100 \mathrm{~kb}$ size)
d. Age proof: Certificate from authorized official where Date of Birth is mentioned.
e. Gap in study: Candidates having passed the qualifying examination in an earlier year (2020, 2019 or 2018) will have to submit (online) a Self-declaration, certifying that she/he was not involved in any unlawful activities during the interim period and that she/he would withdraw admission from any other regular UG course presently enrolled in, if selected for admission. Candidates having more than 3 (three) years of study gap will not be eligible for admission.
f. In case the admission committee is unable to verify a document submitted online, then the concerned candidate may be required to physically visit the University to show the original document for verification. The candidate will be duly notified through the contact number or email ID provided in her/his online application in such a case.
(Marksheets, certificates and such other documents of a student required at the time of online application and admission are to be uploaded in PDF format while the signature and photograph are to be uploaded in JPG/JPEG format)

NOTE: If at any stage any original document of an applicant is found to be fake or fabricated or in any other manner defective OR if any applicant is found to have furnished wrong information, the said applicant will not be admitted and if already admitted, admission will be cancelled without any prior notice in this regard. If the same is found after the completion of the Programme of Study, the applicant's degree will be cancelled and appropriate legal action will be taken against him/her.

## 5. Merit List Preparation

For each of the sets of valid applications received for the UG programmes listed in section 4.1 above, the respective merit list will be according to the descending order of the sum of the marks obtained in English and best 4 (four) other subjects in the qualifying examination. In other words, the position of an applicant in the merit list will be based on the sum of the marks obtained in HS or 10+2 equivalent examination in the best 5 subjects including English.
There will be six separate merit lists prepared from online applications received respectively for
(i) BA Honours (except Mass Communication),
(ii) BSc Honours (Except Biotechnology),
(iii) BA Liberal Arts,
(iv) BSc Honours Biotechnology,
(v) BA Honours Mass Communication, and
(vi) BCA (Bachelor of Computer Applications).

Admission to the programmes specified above shall be strictly from the respective merit lists with the subject specific eligibility conditions taken into consideration. A candidate who does not apply to one of the above programmes will not feature in the merit list of that programme even if she/he meets all eligibility conditions.

### 5.1 Tie-Breaking

For candidates with equal scores in the merit list the tie-breaking rules will be as follows:
(a) In case of an Honours subject, the candidate who has more marks in that subject in the qualifying examination will be placed higher. If neither candidate has the subject in the qualifying examination but the Honours subject has an eligibility condition involving another subject, then the candidate with more marks in that subject will be placed higher in the merit list. If both the above conditions are not applicable then the candidate with more marks in English will be placed higher.
(b) In case of BA Liberal Arts, the candidate who has more marks in English in the qualifying examination will be placed higher. If both have equal marks in English then the candidate with earlier date of birth will be placed higher.
(c) In case of BCA, the candidate who has more marks in Mathematics in the qualifying examination will be placed higher. If both have equal marks in Mathematics then the candidate with higher marks in English will be placed higher.

## 6. Scheme of Waiver of Admission Fee, Tuition Fees etc. of Govt. of Assam:

Till the issue of this document, no order issued by the Government of Assam has been received by the University for the academic year 2021-22 regarding any scheme of Waiver of Admission Fee/ Tuition Fees etc.

## 7. BA \& BSc Honours Programmes in the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS):

Cotton University has updated the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) curriculum for BA Honours and BSc Honours programmes with effect from the academic year 2020-21. All Honours courses follow the CBCS curriculum of 140 credits.

## Outline of courses under CBCS:

Each course of a program will be of one of the following categories:
7.1 Core Course: A course, which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a Core course.
7.2 Elective Course: Generally a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.
a. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course: Elective courses offered in the main discipline/subject of study are referred to as Discipline Specific Electives. Such courses may also be of interdisciplinary nature.
b. Dissertation/Project: An elective course designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to a project work, and a candidate studies such a course on his own with an advisory support by a teacher/faculty member is called dissertation/project.
c. Generic Elective (GE) Course: An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure is called a Generic Elective. The available General Elective subjects are: Anthropology, Arabic, Assamese, Bengali, Bodo, Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science, Economics, Education, English, Environmental Science, Geography, Geology, Hindi, History, Mass Comm. \& Journalism, Mathematics, Persian, Philosophy, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Sanskrit, Statistics, Sociology, and Zoology.
7.3 Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC): The Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses may be of two kinds: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). AECC courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to Knowledge enhancement. These are mandatory for all disciplines. SEC courses are value-based and/or skill-based and are aimed at providing hands-on training, competencies, skills, etc.
a. Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC): Environmental Science, English Communication, and MIL (Assamese, Bengali, Bodo and Hindi).
b. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge.
7.4 Introducing Research Component: A Project/Dissertation is considered as a special course involving application of knowledge in solving/analyzing/exploring a real life situation or a difficult problem. A Project/Dissertation work would be of 6 credits. A Project/ Dissertation work may be given in lieu of a discipline specific elective paper.

Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) in $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ Semester:
i. For BSc Honours Students:

In the First Semester-
All students shall have Environmental Science as AECC.
In the Second Semester-
*Students having studied any of Assamese, Bengali, Bodo and Hindi as MIL course in the qualifying examination, shall take the same MIL as AECC. Otherwise they will take English Communication as AECC
ii. For BA Honours Students:

## In the First Semester

(a) Students with an MIL as their Honours subject: This category of students will take English Communication as their AECC course.
(b) Students with English as their Honours subject: If any of Assamese, Bengali, Bodo or Hindi was a subject of the student in her/his HS or $12^{\text {th }}$ equivalent examination then it will be their AECC course. Otherwise they will take English Communication as AECC course.
(c) Students with neither an MIL nor English as their Honours subject: They will take an MIL as their AECC course if that MIL was a subject for them in the qualifying examination, otherwise they will take English Communication AECC course.

## In the Second Semester

All students shall have Environmental Science as AECC.

## Notes for BA/BSc Honours (CBCS) programmes:

- The Honours subject and a Generic Elective (GE) subject will be assigned to a student at the time of admission based on merit, subject to the availability of seats.
- For having any of Chemistry, Mathematics and Physics as Generic Elective, a student must secure pass marks in the respective subject in the qualifying Examination.
- Generic Elective (GE) subject allotted at the time of admission may be changed only in the $3^{\text {rd }}$ semester. Change of subject will be done on merit basis and is subject to the availability of seats in the concerned department.
- Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) will also be assigned at the time of admission.
- Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) will be allotted in $3^{\text {rd }}$ and $4^{\text {th }}$ Semesters.


## 8. BA Liberal Arts Programme:

Duration of the course: 3 (three) years
Number of Semesters: 6 (six)
Number of seats: 50 (fifty)
This is a six-semester (three year) degree program open for candidates who have cleared their $10+2$ examination in any of the three disciplines (Arts, Commerce, and Science). This program
aims to offer students the opportunity to study a broad range of subjects while developing specialized knowledge in one core subject with the curricular flexibility of enabling a student to acquire knowledge across various disciplines while keeping the option to continue higher study in a Major discipline.

## Outline of Courses and Credits:

The BA in Liberal Arts programme, shall follow a six-semester pattern with a required minimum total of 132 credits. Each course in the program shall be from one of the following categories:
8.1 Foundation Course: A student will study any four subjects of her/his choice as foundation courses from a given pool of diverse subjects across disciplines in the $1^{\text {st }}$ Semester. In the $2^{\text {nd }}$ Semester she/he will have to change two of the foundation course subjects. Third semester onwards the student will study one of the subjects studied as Foundation Course as her/his Major. The idea of studying foundation courses is to allow the students sufficient time to develop interest towards a particular subject and to identify the subject that she/he would study as the Major discipline.
8.2 Core Course: The course that a candidate gets to study most intensively as part of her/his chosen Major discipline, is the Core Course or Specialization.
8.3 Enabler Course: A course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may extend the discipline/subject of study or which provides exposure to some other discipline/subject is termed an Enabler course.
8.4 Ability Enhancement (AE) Courses: The ability enhancement courses are of two types.

- Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC): These are three mandatory courses namely, (a) Environmental Studies, (b) English Communication and (c) Research Methodology.
- Skill Enhancement Course (SEC): These courses may be chosen from a pool of courses designed to provide skill-based knowledge. The primary purpose is to provide students with life-skills in hands-on mode to increase their employability.
8.5 Discipline Specific Elective (DSE): An elective course offered in the main discipline/subject of study is referred to as a Discipline Specific Elective. Such courses may also be of interdisciplinary nature.
8.6 Dissertation/ Capstone: A course in which the student would pursue independent research on a question or problem of their choice that is related to her/his Major discipline, with advisory support by a faculty member to produce a substantial report.


## Course pool:

## Foundation courses / Core courses:

Economics, Education, English, Environmental Science, Geography, History, Mathematics, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, and Statistics.

## Enabler/ Elective courses:

Archaeology, Assamese, Business Mathematics, Cultural studies, Data Analysis, Film and Media Studies, Gender Studies, Health and Nutrition, Legal Studies, Library and Information Science, Sanskrit, Tribal Studies, and Veda Studies.

Skill Enhancement courses:

Classical Music, Creative Writing, Design, Drama, Entrepreneurship, Fine Arts, Foreign (French and German) Language Basic Course, Sattriya Dance, Website Development, and Yoga and Physical Education.

Eligibility: Candidates must pass in Biology, Chemistry and Physics/Mathematics in the qualifying examination.
Duration of the Course: 3 (three) years

Number of Semesters: 6 (six)
Courses and Credit Distribution: Same as for the Choice Based Credit System for BA/ BSc Honours courses.

## BA Honours in Mass Communication and Journalism:

Number of seats: 20 (Twenty) +5 seats reserved for candidates passed under AHSEC
Eligibility: Candidates must pass Higher Secondary or $(10+2)$ equivalent examination.
Duration of the Course: 3(three) years
Number of Semesters: 6(six)
Courses and Credit Distribution: Same as for the Choice Based Credit System for BA/ BSc Honours courses.

## Bachelor of Computer Applications (BCA):

Number of seats: 15 (fifteen) +4 seats reserved for candidates passed under AHSEC
Eligibility: As per Resolution AC/2021/6/4 of the meeting of the CU Academic Council held on 7 August 2021, the eligibility criteria for admission to the BCA programme has been revised and accordingly, an applicant must score a minimum of $60 \%$ marks each in Mathematics, and in any two of Physics, Chemistry, Statistics, Economics and Commerce in HS or $10+2$ equivalent examination.
Duration of the Course: 3 (three) years
Number of Semesters: 6 (six)

## Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) in $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ Semester of BCA:

In the First Semester-
All students shall have Environmental Science as AECC.
In the Second Semester-
Students having studied any of Assamese, Bengali, Bodo and Hindi as MIL course in the qualifying examination, shall take the same MIL as AECC. Otherwise they will take English Communication as AECC

## 10. CREDIT TRANSFER \& ONLINE COURSES

Some papers (e.g. SEC/DSE courses) will be offered, subject to availability, through official MOOCS/SWAYAM platforms of UGC such as per UGC directive. A student enrolled for the UG/PG program in the University must register for a MOOCs course, if it is selected by the respective Department in lieu of a course in the UG curriculum of the Department. The credit earned through such MOOCs courses shall be transferred to the grade sheet of the student to be counted for award of degree.

## 11. RESERVATION RULES FOR ADMISSION TO THE UG PROGRAMMES

11.1 General Reservation Rules: Cotton University follows the same Reservation policy in respect of Admission in to the Undergraduate Course(s) as framed by the Government of Assam from time to time. As per the said Reservation policy, the percentages of seats under different reserved categories are shown below. These rules are applicable for the candidates belonging to the state of Assam only.

Note:
(i) Only Caste/Tribe certificates issued by the Competent Authorities of the Government of Assam will be accepted.
(ii) Caste/Tribe Certificates of OTHER STATE will NOT be valid.
(iii) For candidates belonging to the Economically Weaker Sections (EWS), Income and Asset Certificate issued only by the Local Circle Officer or Circle Officer (A), as stipulated by the Govt of Assam, shall be deemed valid.
11.2 Reservation under Extra-curricular and other (EC etc.) quotas: A few seats may be allotted under Extra-Curricular and other quotas in UG courses to students having outstanding achievements in the field of Sports, Cultural performance, NCC, NSS, Scouts \& Guides, etc. and a few other categories as per the table given below. EC reservation is NOT APPLICABLE for admission to BA in Liberal Arts and the Self-Financing courses. Maximum number of seats reserved for those categories under EC etc. quota in BA Honours and BSc Honours programmes are:

11.3 Reservation for Candidates with disabilities: As per Government rules, $5 \%$ extra seats (of the total number of seats across all disciplines) are reserved for the Candidates with disabilities (DA). The applicants under this category may have to appear before a medical board with the relevant certificate(s).


## Important Notes for Admission in quotas for EC etc. and DA categories:

(a) Certificates/ testimonials, in case of EC quota should not be more than 3 (three) years old.
(b) In view of the Covid-19 situation the University may not conduct any trials offline mode for students seeking admission in EC quota under sports category. Details will be published in the notification mentioned above.
(c) A candidate selected under EC quota can be allotted an Honours subject only if her/his Standardized mark (as per the merit list) is within $25 \%$ below the cut-off mark in UR category of that particular subject in the regular admission.
(d) For an outstanding sportsperson or cultural performer who represented the country in a recognized International event, the condition of cut-off mark in (c) above shall be relaxed. However the total number of reserved seats in that particular EC quota will remain unchanged.
(e) If a student admitted under EC quota refuses to participate in any sports/ cultural event of her/his proficiency when officially selected to represent Cotton University, then her/his
studentship may be terminated/ forfeited. A written undertaking in this regard will have to be submitted by the student.

(f) BA Honours in Mass Communication \& Journalism: Rs 6,800.00 + Rs 14,500.00 (one semester fee) = Rs. 21,300.00
(g) BSa Honours in Biotechnology: Rs 7,600.00 + Rs. 14,500.00 (one semester fee) + Rs 7,000.00 (additional laboratory fee for one semester) = Rs. 29,100.00
(h) BCA: Rs. 7,600 $+14,500($ one semester fee $)=22,100.00$
